CONTINENTS ADRIFT, A STUDY OF THE SCIENTIFIC METHOD. 16mm, color, sound, 15 min. Follows the theory of continental drift to what is now worldwide acceptance. It begins in 1912 with Alfred Wegener's hypothesis that at one time, all the continents were one: Pangaea. The film examines paleomagnetism and sea-floor spreading. Shows the sound synthesizer and how it can create, envelope and filter sounds. THE GARBAGE EXPLOSION. 16mm, color or b&w, sound, 16 min. A rapidly growing economy is producing equally rapid environmental pollution, with the vast increase in waste materials. This film investicrease in waste materials. This film investigates the nature, volume and composition of solid wastes, which include a growing proportion of less destructible paper, metals, plastic and glass. It presents advantages and disadvantages of our current disposal methods and shows possible long-range solutions. Audience: elementary, secondary, general. THE NATURE OF SOUND (second edition). 16mm, color or b&w, sound, 13 min. Illustrates the sources of sound, the path of sound waves, and sound as a form of wave energy. High-speed photography, demonstrations and original experiments show vibrating sound sources, sound moving through powder, air, metal and water. Transfer of sound energy from molecule to molecule is demonstrated with magnets, and sound wave form with an oscilloscope. The film pictures sound waves in terms of amplitude and frequency, which determines loudness and pitch; and quality which is determined by the shape of the wave. It also shows the Doppler effect, and how knowing the speeds at which sound travels through various media helps geologists and oceanographers measure great depths on earth and in the sea. WAVE MOTION: DIFFRACTION. 16mm, b&w, sound, 8 min. Demonstrates the phenomenon of optical diffraction by viewing an illuminated slit and altering its aperture; then examines in a ripple tank the nature of diffraction and the resulting interference fringes. Provides a basis for the qualitative study of diffraction and is a useful preliminary to the quantitative and theoretical development in advanced studies. Demonstrations prepared and conducted by L.
