## **Observing the Constellations**

An A-Z Guide for the Amateur Astronomer By John Sanford

Exploring 88 constellations in alphabetical sequence, Observing the Constellations is a fascinating introduction for casual stargazers and a valuable reference tool for experienced amateur astronomers. Each constellation is beautifully documented with both a full-color photograph and a detailed star map. Sanford's photographs show the constellations as they actually appear in the night sky an innovative and valuable aid for finding and identifying specific objects. The detailed star maps, prepared by Wil Tirion, a leading astrocartographer, not only show the brighter stars that are easily visible with the naked eye, but also give the positions of fainter objects — stars, nebulae and clusters — that more serious astronomers will want to observe. The book also provides background information on each constellation, including a clear explanation of how to find it in the sky, a description of the stars and of unusual or exotic objects that appear within the constellation, and a discussion of the mythology association with it.
