




Imponderables™—the Series and Who Put the Butter in Butterfly?



Where was the Garden of Eden? What's so bad about the Badlands? Why does the Nile run North? Davis proves that there is a lot more to geography than labeling countries on a map.


For all those who have felt geographically ignorant ever since gas stations stopped handing out free maps, here is all they need to know in one enormously informative and highly entertaining volume.
